La Jolla, close to Scripps Pier and UC San Diego

San Diego's hidden swings are a thing of legend. No one knows who put them up and sometimes they disappear for a while, only to reappear later. Wherever they pop up, you can be sure they'll have chosen an idyllic location with beautiful views.

You can find one hidden in the neighborhood of La Jolla, close to Scripps Pier and UC San Diego. As you walk down Expedition Way towards Birch Aquarium, keep an eye open for a parking lot on your left side. Enter the parking lot and walk towards the cul-de-sac. You should see two trees with a small wooden bridge between them. Follow the path and you should find the tree swings to your left.







W Spruce St, San Diego, CA 92103

Nestled away in the Banker's Hill neighborhood, this pedestrian-only bridge makes for the perfect photoshoot opportunity. Built in 1912 and engineered by Edwin Capps, the 400 feet of this rustic bridge were intended to carry locals across the gaping canyon below (don't look down!). It is still standing strong as a favorite spot for locals to take a dreamy, gently swaying stroll above the area's treetops.



Point Loma, San Diego, CA 92106

BAYSIDE TRAIL

The Bayside Trail offers a moment of peace away from the hustle and bustle of the city. The winding, out-and-back route provides a wealth of incomparably beautiful and singular views along this 2.4-mile stretch. While it's mostly leisurely walking, there are some steeper spots to contend with. Once you've cleared the summit, we recommend you set your sights down to the Point Loma Tidepools and Bluffs Trail for an extra, very manageable, one-mile hike to the famous tidepools.







1549 El Prado San Diego, CA 92101

While well-trodden Balboa Park isn't exactly a hidden gem, it's a wonderland of things to see, do, and marvel at. An abundance of museums, restaurants, public art, and swathes of flowers, trees, and everything else to feed your nature cravings, to be exact.


Try to find the two-acre plot curated by Famed Kate Sessions, the talented horticulturist responsible for introducing several new plant species to southern California. Access includes walking down a secluded, winding path before an oasis of colors and scents opens up before you.



857 W Harbor Dr, San Diego, CA 92101

As you stroll by the shops and restaurants that make up San Diego's Seaport Village, a glint of color may catch your eye! The work of art you're viewing is one of America's oldest carousels. From the imagination of Charles I. D. Looff, the father of carousels in America, it took its first turn in Fair Park, Texas, in 1895 – the starting point of its cross-country trek. Its travels then took the wooden structure to Santa Monica, California, in the 1950s; Spanaway, Washington, in the 1970s; Portland, Oregon, in 1979; and Burbank, California, in 1997, finally making it to San Diego in 2004.

If you'd like to take part in a tradition that has brought smiles to the faces of children and parents for over a century, it'll cost you only \$3 to take a ride through history on this unique San Diego treasure.







1325 Coast Blvd., La Jolla, CA 92037

Accessed through The Cave Store, you will descend over 100 steps down through the sandstone cliffs of La Jolla Cove into this Prohibition times sea cave. The Sunny Jim Cave received its name from the author of Wizard of Oz, L. Frank Baum, who claimed the grand opening of the cave reminded him of a cartoon cereal mascot of the same name. As local folklore would have it, during Prohibition, bootleggers used this tunnel to smuggle alcohol and opium into San Diego!





MUSHROOM HOUSE

While its given name is Pavilion, locals fondly refer to this impressive coast side construction as the "Mushroom House" for a visibly obvious reason. Located at Blacks Beach in La Jolla, CA, this house was built in 1965 by architect Dale Naegle for Sam Bell of Bell's Potato Chips &; General Mills as a summer guest house.

The home was built to withstand naturally occurring rock slides, earthquakes, and waves and features a .300-foot tramway that took guests from the main house down to the guest house.

The house is no trespassing, but feel free to explore the surroundings, where you'll be treated to a public beach accessible at low tide from Scripps or Torrey Pines Beach.







1670 India St, San Diego, CA 92101





This rare gem can be found deep within the beautiful historic neighborhood of Mission Hills. As you savor your meal, absorb the historical décor around you, inspired by the legendary folklore and arts of native New Mexico.

Their menu is centered around European-influenced tapas, as well as snacks, cheese & Darcuterie boards, farm-inspired soup and salad, and entrée – to die for. We recommend sampling their hand-selected old and new world wines and sharing plates.

Serving out of San Diego's two favorite surfer havens (Leucadia and Ocean Beach), Peace Pies is serving up raw vegan food. While the vibe is laidback, the flavors are serious, with the dedicated staff handmaking each carefully curated (and very Instagrammable) dish with love and patience.
